

SOUTH HOLLAND POLICE OFFICERS TO ISSUE KIDS FREE SLURPEE COUPONS FOR GOOD BEHAVIOR

South Suburban College Coach Darrell Scott was recently selected for the NJCAA (National Junior College Athletic Association) Region IV Hall of Fame.


Coach Scott is a 1987 graduate of Grinnell College and is entering his 24th season of coaching women's basketball at South Suburban College. This is his first and only head coaching

South Holland Preschool Jump Starts Kids Education

Preschool education and kindergarten readiness are essential to every child's educational success.

For South Holland, a commitment to early childhood education goes back 50 years. From the preschool's first location on South Park Avenue to its current location at the South Holland Community Center, this program has served families in the community with positive results.

Today, the program offers half- and full-day options with early morning and late afternoon care, and is directed by Dawn Stremplewski, who has been a part of the program since 1989.

Stremplewski is proud to be part of the long history of early childhood education in South Holland. She is committed to providing a variety of educational opportunities that the children will need in order to be competitive in life.

"When the 4-year-olds graduate from our program they are ready for kindergarten," said Stremplewski. "We begin reading and writing skills with our 3-year-old group and continue the next year



with the 4-year-old group. Kids are like sponges, they learn so quickly, so it is easy to teach new skills to them."

Each class had a total of 22 children who are taught by eight teachers. The children rotate in small groups between learning stations where they have a lesson from each teacher. They also have free play, rest hour and hot meals.

"We believe in teaching children independence and getting them ready to thrive in a competitive world," said Stremplewski. "So, through activities like show and tell, we are teaching them to speak in front of others and ask thoughtful questions. These are life skills they can take with them."

In addition to learning stations, children are introduced to the Spanish language through numbers and days of the week. The school does not have a bilingual program, but does invite bilingual children to participate.

What would preschool be without field trips? The preschoolers attend the circus, Disney on Ice, the apple orchard, the pumpkin patch, and the South Holland Fire Station during Fire Prevention Week.

Parents interested in enrolling their children in the program can take advantage of the 10 percent discount offered by the Community Center during registration. The program is open to 22 students for each level and is oftentimes at capacity.

Thornwood's Danny Gray receives Golden Apple Award for Excellence in Teaching



The Golden Apple, a leading nonprofit foundation committed to celebrating and developing great teachers with the ability and passion to make life-changing differences in the lives of students, surprised Gray with the award during one of his NFTE classes.

For the 2016 awards, more than 400 9th-12th grade educators were nominated by their students, parents, school staff, community leaders, school administration, and colleagues as a teacher who has positively affected the school community.

Gray teaches five sections of an entrepreneurship course in partnership with the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship's Chicago Metro office. Annually, he reaches just over 100 students, some with discipline and behavioral challenges, with empathy and reassurance as they complete an original business plan for the course.

In his four years of teaching the NFTE course at Thornwood High School, he has led two student teams to the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship National Youth Entrepreneurship Challenge; a business plan competition where NFTE students pitch to esteemed judges for a chance to win venture capital for their future success.

In 2013, two of Gray's students Jesus Fernandez and Toheeb Okenla won the national prize of \$25,000 in seed money for their business, and now the NFTE alumni and students at the University of Illinois are awaiting the first shipment of their product from the manufacturer.

In addition to his commitment to NFTE Chicago Metro, Gray also spearheads a men's group entitled "A Few Good Men", which offers guidance and mentorship to male youth that reaches 125 young men.

The Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship is a national organization with 27 years of experience training and supporting teachers like Danny Gray to implement a comprehensive entrepreneurship curriculum in urban high schools, creating an innovative entrepreneurial ecosystem for Chicago's youth.

RESIDENTS YOU SHOULD KNOW

A Dream of Peace, A Musical Tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King

Dr. Martin Luther King professed a world of peace, promise and passion. His message resonated throughout the world as the bells of racial inequality rang loud in America in the 1950s and 60s. He harnessed the power and spirit of our nation's youth to take on the mantel of justice and equality.

Today, Dr. King is still calling to our youth to stand up, speak out and march on behalf of those who can't or won't do it for themselves. South Holland resident Jeffrey Rush and his family answered Dr. King's call. This past February, in collaboration with his brother Donald, the Rush family released a song, A Dream of Peace to honor Dr. King, and their father Henry Rush.

"My father, Henry Rush (pictured right), originally penned the song The Story of Martin Luther King, said Jeffrey. "It was recorded and performed by the legendary gospel group the Norfleet brothers. My brother Donald and I rewrote the song and had my daughter, Kennedy Rush and niece, Noelani McComb (pictured below I-r), to record the vocals."



Henry Rush died in 2004 leaving a rich and deep rooted history of African-American achievements reminiscent of Dr. King's call to stand up and speak out. Henry was a trailblazer and voice for many African Americans in Chicago through the 1960s. As a young disc jockey from Alabama, Henry made a name for himself in the city as the creator of the swing session show on WXRT in 1967. Rush later launched Mail Call on WGN radio, a postal worker's news show, and produced the first exclusive Christmas special on Channel 26, featuring the postal workers choir.

Henry didn't stop there. As a singer and songwriter, he founded Rush Record company where his song The Story of Martin Luther King was written and recorded. He was a man of many talents who was committed to his faith, family and future.



"My father left his family a legacy to continue when he wrote this song," said Jeffrey. "His song is very relevant for our youth today. When we look around and see what is happening with our young men and women who are struggling with so many issues, we have to send a message to them that resonates and inspires them."

The Rush family recently hosted A Dream of Peace record release red carpet event at Kennedy King College and sang at Operation PUSH to promote the song. They also have been promoting the record on WKKC radio and other local radio shows and community events.

"This is an important time in our history," said Dr. Maureen Rush, wife of Jeffrey Rush. "Children need to understand that the pathway has been paved with the lives of people who worked hard to make it easier for them. They have a responsibility to pick up the baton and not let their ancestor's work be in vain."

This record is an honor not only to Dr. King but also to Henry Rush who was inspired by Dr. King who said, "The time is always right to do what is right." Library Makeover Focuses on Family and Youth Services

If you haven't recently visited the South Holland Library, you're in for a real treat. Over the last year, the lower level (pictured below) has transformed into a new world to open the minds, eyes and ears of young residents. With newly opened spaces, brightly colored walls, additional computers, gaming stations, and a host of new book genres and titles, neighborhood youth have a place to visit daily and engage in positive activities.

This is no traditional library space. Large video monitors for gaming, comfortable lounge chairs, a vending machine, and tables for craft projects fill the space. All the comforts that a young crowd would enjoy are available. Youth Services also has expanded its programming to meet the needs and requests from parents looking to participate in activities with their children.

"The toddler play area has been remodeled and we've added a new program space to accommodate more family activities," said Koll. "Parents appreciate being able to engage with their kids. We've seen participation increase three to four times over the last year and we're excited to be able to provide more activities for them."

A big part of the increase in family participation has been that programming age ranges have been expanded to accommodate families with multiple children. Youth Services has programs for children from birth to 18 years. This offers many families the chance to include everyone in the fun. And fun is a big part of the learning.

The Youth Services department has Lego Clubs, Robotics, Museum of Science and Industry STEM programs, Paws to Read, needle craft, knitting, cross stitch, and so much more. Teen programming has expanded to include cultural activities like anime and manga club that explores Japanese art, storytelling and graphic novels. Teens are also encouraged to participate in program development and implementation through the Teen Advisory Board.

Youth Services also has expanded its Spanish book selection and service. "We've increased the number of Spanish books, particularly for early readers and have bilingual staff to communicate with Spanish speaking families.

This summer Youth Services will host its summer reading program with a kick-off party on June 4. There will be a petting zoo, a host of family activities and food. This is one of the many ways that Youth Services brings attention to programs that encourage young readers to make reading a lifetime habit.

WISDOM FROM OUR CHURCHES

Far-Sighted Pain

This past week I finished teaching Christian Worldview for another cohort at Trinity Christian College. This cohort was just ten students, four males and six females. There were two Muslims and at least five non-practicing Catholics. Some of the students are older and looking for a second career. Other students are in their mid-twenties, already having gone to at least three different colleges, four different majors, and have racked up least \$25,000 in student debt. Their last assignment is an oral presentation on their final Worldview paper. It's roughly a 5- minute presentation with some follow-up questions and answers. I was reminded once again of the normalcy of brokenness which is a part of all of our stories. One guy shared how his 26 year-old brother died last year from cancer. A female student shared openly about being in an abusive relationship. Another student shared the painful journey of the incarceration of her ex-husband. Another student shared how her father died last April from early on-set Alzheimer's. Another student was honest enough to share his deepest fears of fitting in and not fitting in with certain groups of friends.

I sat in the back row jotting down notes just reminded again at how the one thing which unites all of our stories is pain. This wildly diverse group of people all had some story, some nugget, some experience of pain. I was humbled by their candor. I was encouraged by their testimony. I was thankful to be a part of a cohort that was willing to be vulnerable with each other. Still, I couldn't help but think, "What's the Christian answer to all this pain?" As the pastor and professor in the room, I felt compelled in some way to provide an answer or at least some context to their pain. I didn't. I couldn't. It's one thing to name those painful experiences, but it's an entirely and completely different narrative trying to make sense of such pain.



To be honest, I think we try and make immediate sense of that pain by justifying it somehow. We're better,

stronger, and more compassionate as a result of it. But as I look in my own life, am I a better pastor as a result of my parent's divorce? Sure. But I would trade my parents having a healthy marriage that celebrates 30 years over having gone through the carnage that is divorce. And absolutely, I'm eternally grateful for the sacrifices that my mom and others made for me to fill in those voids along the way. Or think about a stillborn baby or kids chained to addiction or car crashes that take lives. Don't you think we'd rather learn pain another way? You know what I mean? I could have learned the lessons of life's pain in a far less debilitating way. So while we might try to justify pain in some immediate sense, that answer still leaves me unsatisfied.

So maybe it's as simple and as complicated as in the end, God's vision of peace on earth wins out, right? I mean, we believe that. The Bible assures us of this. In the end, love, hope, peace and grace win out. Every tear will be wiped away. The lion will lie down with the lamb. The dragon will be cast out and the lamb is on the throne. That's it, my friends. So in a lot of ways it means that we need to do the difficult work of being far-sighted when it comes to our experience with pain. Seeing beyond our own temporal experiences. Seeing the justice and the grace of God in the midst of pain. Seeing the loving kindness from individuals who are conduits of God smack dab in the middle of pain.

Is that a cop-out answer? Maybe some will think so. But it's what I need to believe. I need to believe that in the end of all this pain and suffering, we know we have a real sense of home and wholeness in God's redemptive plan made perfect in Jesus Christ. In the end, it's all we've got, right? And maybe that's more than just enough.

Flood Proofing SERIES

Flood insurance - a wise investment

It is difficult to think of flood plains without also thinking of flooding. And nobody likes it when their home or business or neighborhood gets flooded. But flood plain areas are now also recognized as having an intrinsic value of their own as a part of the interconnected ecosystem and an influential role in increasing a community's quality of life. For example, the recognized benefits of a naturally functioning flood plain include the storage and conveyance of flood waters, the recharging of groundwater, the maintenance of surface water quality, and the provision of habitats for fish and wildlife.

These areas also provide diverse recreational opportunities, scenic value, and a source of community identity and pride. Clearly the potential gains of transforming stream and river flood plains from problem areas into value-added community assets are substantial.

Floods have caused a greater loss of life and property and have disrupted more families and communities in the United States than all other natural hazards combined. Despite the expenditure of tens of billions of tax dollars for structural measures, such as dams, levees, and channel projects to try to control flood waters, flood losses continue to rise. Thus, a new way of thinking about flood plain management has emerged in recent years that focuses on hazard mitigation. Flood hazard mitigation places greater emphasis on trying to adapt to the natural phenomena of flooding such as by maintaining flood hazard areas as open space, and less on trying to control floodwaters.

Flood plains play a valuable role in providing natural and beneficial functions to the area around, and including South Holland. Floodplains that are relatively undisturbed provide a wide range of benefits to both human and natural systems. These benefits provide aesthetic pleasures as well as function to provide active processes such as filtering nutrients. The Little Calumet River at Gouwens Park and Veterans Park, are both floodplains. Both are used as a means of recreation, discovery and are considered "wetlands". Both floodplains contain historic and archeological sites that provide opportunity for education and study. Both enhance waterfowl, fish and other wildlife habitats and provide feeding/ breeding grounds. Both floodplains provide natural erosion control and open space so further flooding damage does not occur.

The Village of South Holland is working to improve the flood plain for natural and recreational purposes. Gouwens Park and Sports Complex has a wetland and a bikeway. The Village is cleaning up the banks and channels both for flood protection and appearance purposes. The Gouwens Park wetland mitigation site consists of approximately 5 acres of native prairie, native wetland plantings, and open water. The site will remain as a natural wetland/prairie complex on the park property. In its natural setting, the site is used by a variety of wildlife and could easily be used for environmental education. In addition, the area undergoes flooding from the adjacent river and was designed to function in that manner. Who knows? Someday the river front may be the main attraction in town.

It is important to recognize that the flood plains serve many functions besides carrying or storing floodwaters. Thus, we should keep the water as clean as possible to help fish and other wildlife. Here are some things residents can do to protect the river:

- Bag or compost all yard waste.
- Take used motor oil to a licensed recycling plant.
- Do not wash paints, thinners, anti-freeze, and other chemicals into the street. Take leftovers to a household hazardous waste collection center.
- Cover bare soil with a mulch and seed it as soon as possible to minimize erosion.
- Carefully apply lawn chemicals and limit the amount of fertilizers and pesticides being used.
- Keep as much green areas as possible as natural or man-made drainage swales. Plant plenty of trees and shrubs.

Watersheds—the Big Picture

While it is important for communities to plan and take responsibility for the land uses that occur in their own flood plains, it must be recognized that flood level and water quality can be very much affected by land use activities occurring elsewhere in the watershed. Land uses along tributaries are likely to have an impact on downstream communities. Wise management of tributaries is therefore extremely important, as their protection can yield benefits for the entire network. Broad planning efforts among communities with a watershed can thus have far-reaching advantages.

Flood-proofing projects pay dividends for South Holland residents

Now that the rainy season is upon us, Planning, Development and Code Enforcement (Code) reminds residents of flood assistance programs available to qualified applicants for pre-approved floodproofing projects.

For example, residents planning to install overhead sewers in their homes to alleviate flooding problems may be eligible for a grant to cover a portion of the project costs.

The Flood Assistance Rebate and a Sewer Back-up Pilot Program may be available for the following projects:

SURFACE WATER PROJECTS

- Diversion of downspout water
- Flood walls

SEWER BACKUP PROJECTS

- Overhead sewers (repairs and installation)
- Removal of sump pump and down spout connections from sanitary sewers
- Back flow valves

SUBSURFACE PROJECTS

- Interior and/or exterior drain tile
- Crack repair and/or waterproofing foundation walls

It is imperative that those planning to apply for the flood rebate or sewer back-up pilot program contact the Code Department at 16240 Wausau, or call 210-2915, before beginning any flood-control project.

A department representative will meet with the resident, inspect their property and assist in completion of the necessary grant application. The department can also provide a list of contractors who are licensed to do business in South Holland, if requested.

Homeowners are advised to allow plenty of time to secure the required pre-approval and minimum of two bid proposals from contractors.

These are great programs and many residents who have taken advantage of this opportunity are grateful for the benefit that comes with flood proofing their home.



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
